Career Exploration for Middle School Students

One of the roles of middle school educators is to help students understand how their current educational and personal choices will affect their future life roles, in particular their choices for a career.

According to Sandra Kerka, "middle school students need to learn to think about the future; recognize their responsibility for educational planning; broaden their aspirations beyond the stereotypes of gender, ethnicity, and socioeconomic level; develop and maintain self-esteem; develop cognitive complexity (essential for the knowledge work of the future); have parental support for career choices; understand how school relates to future life roles; and recognize the broad scope of work in the 21st century."*

One step that a student can take in this process is to begin developing a "Career Portfolio."

Why a Career Portfolio?

- Allows students to showcase their best work and accomplishments
- Offers an opportunity for students to define and record their interests, skills, and experiences.
- Provides a tool for students to reflect on their personal progress academically and personally.

SHIELD ACTIVITY "Coat of Arms"

Students are to draw pictures (no words) for each block. Once the students complete their shields, have volunteers share their shields. After sharing, discuss how their interests relate to possible career choices.

Box 1

Something about themselves they would like others to know about them (blue eyes, always smiling, great athlete, etc.)

Box 2

Someone that they admire or look up to (i.e. type of person they are or their career)

Box 3

Students WRITE their last names


Box 4

Favorite school activity, sport or class

Box 5

Career/work that they wish to pursue after high school

BUSINESS CARD

After the students complete the Shield Activity, they are to design their own business card on a 3×5 index card. Their card will reflect the work/career they wish to pursue after high school graduation.

AUTOBIOGRAPHY (My Commercial)

Students are to write their autobiography in a commercial format. The commercial can be designed for television or radio. Encourage the students to be creative.

Future Plans Part II

It is important to think about what you like to do and to explore a variety of career areas. The time you spend now doing career exploration and assessment will help you later to decide which career path is best for you.

There are many tools and activities that you can use to gather information about yourself—your particular strengths, abilities, interests, and learning styles. After gathering this information, you can begin to investigate careers that match your personal characteristics.

Samples of your work that are three-dimensional (e.g., videotapes, CDs, physical items) and cannot be placed in the binder may accompany the portfolio. However, instead of the sample itself, consider including a photograph and a note explaining the item. Please include notes where necessary to explain a little about when, why, and for whom a project was completed. If you were responsible for only part of the project, explain which part was yours.

If you have awards or certificates, make photocopies for your portfolio binder.
